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INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

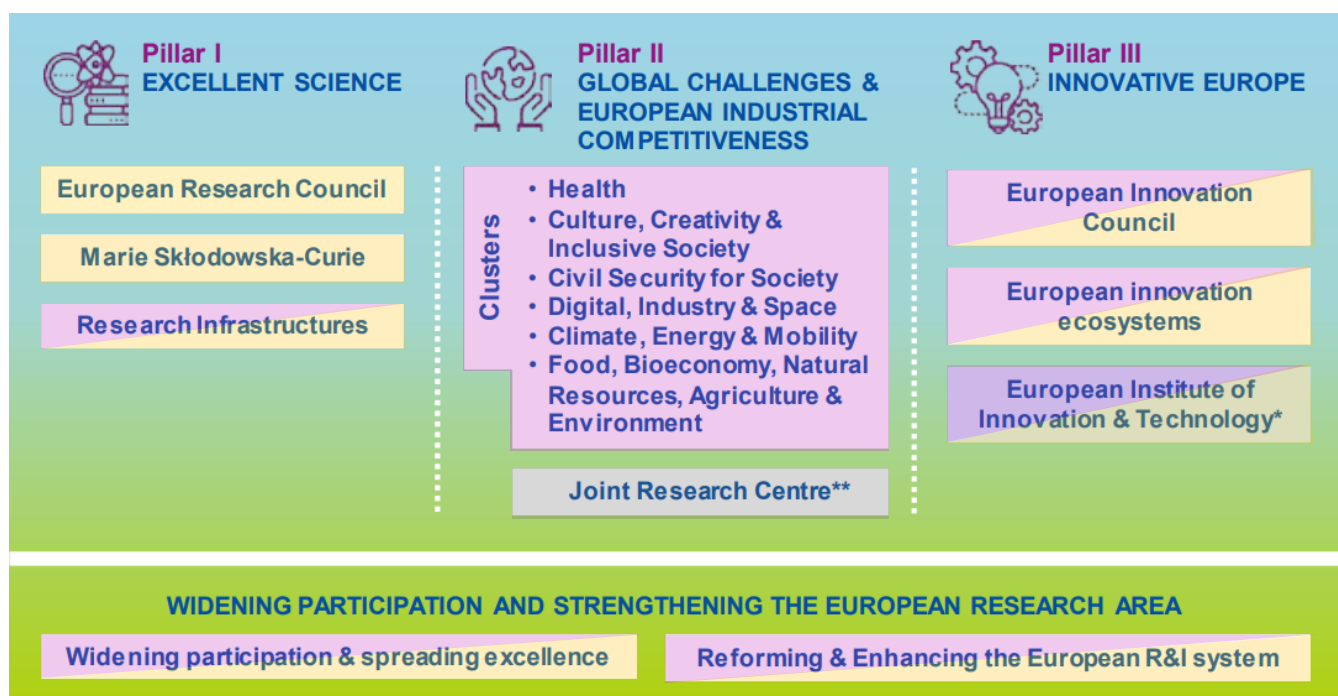
This document aims to give an overview of health-related funding opportunities across [Horizon Europe](#), the EU's Research and innovation funding programme 2021-2027. Horizon Europe is worth €95.5 Billion.

Horizon Europe funds all types of organisations¹ including academia, Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (SMEs), large companies, charities, hospitals, patient groups, regulators, government department and any other types of organisations.

Horizon Europe funds all research and innovation sectors and has two main types of funding calls:

- **Open calls** that leave it up to the applicants to decide the Research and Innovation area; and
- **Challenge driven calls** that specify the Research and Innovation area to be done.

Horizon Europe consists of 3 Pillars, as shown in the diagram below:



Key:

Open to all research and innovation fields

Challenge driven – must solve the problem posed – not bottom-up idea driven

Each part of Horizon Europe has a [Work Programme](#) which lists the funding opportunities and calls for proposals. Most parts of Horizon Europe have two-year Work Programmes covering 2026-2027, apart from the European Research Council (ERC) and European Innovation Council (EIC), which have annual Work Programmes. The 2026-2027 Horizon Europe Work Programmes total over 2700 pages - so **the aim of this document is to highlight the health funding opportunities across Horizon Europe with deadlines between September and December 2026** – not only in the Health Work Programme (Pillar II, Cluster 1) but also the many opportunities across the rest of the programme. We hope that you find this document useful. Tables with yellow headers have mostly open calls, tables with pink headers have mostly challenge driven

calls, and tables with grey headers have a mixture of both. We have used these colour codes throughout this document.

Work Programmes

- **This document covers the calls from the 2026-2027 Work Programmes with deadlines between Sept and Dec 2026**
- If there are any calls open from older Work Programmes, then we have not included these.

The 2026-2027 Work Programmes will be the last Work Programmes under the current Horizon Europe Research and Innovation funding programme (2021-2027).

Types of Project

The main types of project in Horizon Europe are listed below, and we have used the abbreviations for these project types throughout this document. These project types are explained further on page 15 of the [General Annexes to the 2026-2027 Work Programme](#). The most common project types are:

- Research and Innovation Actions (RIAs)
- Innovation Actions (IAs)
- Coordination and Support Actions (CSAs)

Some parts of Horizon Europe also have other project types, and where that is the case (for example for the European Research Council, for Marie Skłodowska Curie Actions and for the European Innovation Council) we have explained this in the relevant section of this document.

Did you know?

- Most (but not all) parts of Horizon Europe need a consortium involving different countries. We have tried to highlight whether a consortium is needed or not in the introduction to each section of this document.

PILLAR I (EXCELLENT SCIENCE)

PILLAR I - OVERVIEW

Pillar I of Horizon Europe (Excellent Science) has three Work Programmes, each of which contains a variety of funding opportunities summarised below, and then explained in more detail further on in this document.

- **[European Research Council \(ERC\)](#): The ERC funds all fields of research.** It provides long-term funding for ground-breaking frontier research, and funds a Principal Investigator (PI) or PIs and their team(s). The PI and team can be at the same Host Institution, but this is not a requirement and PIs/team members can also be other organisations in the same country or different countries.
- **[Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions \(MSCAs\)](#): The MSCAs fund all fields of research and innovation.** The MSCAs are the EU's flagship programme for doctoral education and postdoctoral training. MSCAs fund excellent research and innovation to equip researchers at all career stages with new knowledge and skills, through mobility across borders and exposure to different sectors and disciplines. Some funding calls require a consortium of organisations in different countries, whilst other funding calls can fund a single organisation or single postdoctoral fellow.

- **Research Infrastructures:** Some funding opportunities are open to research infrastructures relating to all fields of research and innovation, whilst others are focussed on research infrastructures in specific research and innovation areas (for example health). Research Infrastructures are facilities, resources and services that allow researchers and innovators to conduct ground-breaking research. They include research laboratories, scientific instrumentation and technologies, data resources, computational tools, and communication networks. Funding calls in the Research Infrastructures Work Programme typically require a consortium of organisations in three different countries.

PILLAR I - EUROPEAN RESEARCH COUNCIL (ERC)

ERC Overview:

The [European Research Council](#)'s (ERC's) mission is to encourage the highest quality research in Europe through competitive funding and to support **investigator-driven frontier research across all fields**, based on scientific excellence. **The ERC provides long-term funding for ground-breaking research and its main grant schemes fund a Principal Investigator (PI) or PIs and their team.**

During an ERC grant, the PI (or PIs) are based at a Host Institution which is typically (but does not have to be) a university or public research institution. The PI(s) do not have to be based at the Host Institution at the time of the ERC application. The team members can be at the same Host Institution as the PI(s) but can also be at other organisations in the same or different countries – see the information in the tables below, the ERC website, ERC Work Programme and call documents for full information.

The [2026 ERC Work Programme](#) has the remaining funding schemes with deadlines in 2026:

- **ERC Advanced Grants** (deadline 27 August 2026)
- **ERC Plus Grant** - this is a **new ERC funding scheme** to support outstanding researchers from Europe and anywhere in the world with bold ideas and a vision for transformative research that goes beyond the scope of existing ERC programmes. This new scheme was introduced in the 2026 Work Programme (deadline 2 September 2026).
- **ERC Proof of Concept Grants** – for those who are already the ERC Principal Investigator under one of the ERC's main frontier research grants (Staring, Consolidator, Advanced or Synergy grant) who want to explore the commercial or societal potential of their ERC work (deadline 17 September 2026).

On 20 July 2026, the [2027 ERC Work Programme was published](#) with the calls listed below which have deadlines between Sept and Dec 2026. If you are interested in these calls, please also see the ERC press release "[Applying for an ERC grant in the 2027 competitions: what you need to know.](#)"

- **ERC Starting Grants** (deadline 14 October 2026)

The ERC [press release with information on 'applying for an ERC grant in 2027 competitions: what you need to know'](#) which includes changes on the eligibility windows for Starting and Consolidator Grants for the 2027 calls:

"To be eligible for an ERC Starting Grant in the 2027 call for proposals, the applicant must have defended their PhD no more than 10 years before 1 January 2027. For a Consolidator Grant in the 2027 call, the thesis defence must have been between 5 and 15 years before 1 January 2027. The eligibility period may be extended in duly documented cases, such as parental leave or clinical training. Researchers will be awarded at most one Starting Grant and one Consolidator Grant during their career."

Who can apply: An ERC Advanced Grant Principal Investigator is expected to be an active researcher with a track record of significant research achievements. Criteria: Applications can be made in any field of research. The ERC's grants operate on a 'bottom-up' basis without predetermined priorities. Who can apply: Outstanding principal investigators who address major scientific challenges. Scholars at all career stages can apply for an ERC Plus Grant if they have an outstanding record of scientific achievement at the forefront of their field. Their intellectual leadership will be evaluated in accordance with their career stage. Criteria: Applications can be made in any field of research. The ERC's grants operate on a 'bottom-up' basis without predetermined priorities. Location: Research must be conducted at a legal entity (known as a host institution, HI). The HI could be where the applicant already works, or any other HI located in one of the EU Member States or Horizon Europe Associated Countries. The PI does not need to be employed by the HI at the time of ERC proposal submission.

	Team: ERC grants support projects carried out by an individual researcher (Principal Investigator, PI) who can employ researchers of any nationality as team members. It is also possible to have one or more team members located in a non-European country. Funding: Up to €7 million for a period of 4 to 7 years. ERC Proof of Concept Grant Current call: ERC-2026-PoC (Part of the ERC's 2026 Work Programme) Deadline: 17 Sept 2026 Future call: ERC-2027-PoC (Part of the ERC's 2027 Work Programme) Deadlines: 10 March 2027 and 16 September 2027	For researchers who have already received an ERC grant for their frontier research project and now want to explore the commercial or societal potential of their work. Who can apply: All Principal Investigators (PIs) in one of the ERC frontier research main grants (Starting, Consolidator, Advanced or Synergy) are eligible to participate and apply for an ERC Proof of Concept (PoC) Grant. PIs in an ongoing main grant, or PIs in a main grant that has ended after 1 January 2025, are eligible to apply. Criteria: The ERC PoC funding is only for those who already have an ERC award, and is to establish proof of concept of an idea that was generated during their ERC-funded projects. Funding: A lump sum of €150 thousand for a period of 18 months. Full information: ERC website, Work Programme and Call Documents. The details above are for the ERC Proof of Concept Grants call in the 2026 ERC Work Programme. If you intend to apply for the 2027 ERC Proof of Concept Call, then you will need to check the European Research Council (ERC) 2027 Work Programme and Call Documents. UK applicants: please note that ERC frontier grants (Starting, Consolidator, Advanced and Synergy Grants) that were evaluated by the ERC but funded by the UK/UKRI Horizon Europe Guarantee are not eligible to apply to ERC Proof of Concept. Swiss applicants: please contact the Swiss ERC National Contact Point for advice.

PILLAR I - MARIE SKŁODOWSKA-CURIE ACTIONS (MSCA)

MSCA Overview:

The [Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions \(MSCA\)](#) are the EU's flagship programme for doctoral education and postdoctoral training and are open to **all domains of research and innovation**.

The MSCAs fund excellent research and innovation to equip researchers at all career stages with new knowledge and skills, through mobility across borders and exposure to different sectors and disciplines. The MSCA help build Europe's capacity for research and innovation by investing in the long-term careers of excellent researchers.

The MSCA also fund the development of excellent doctoral and postdoctoral training programmes and collaborative research projects worldwide. By doing so, they achieve a structuring impact on higher education institutions, research centres and non-academic organisations.

Some MSCA funding calls require a consortium of organisations in different countries, whilst other funding calls can fund a single organisation or single postdoctoral fellow.

Types of Doctoral Networks: Doctoral Networks implement doctoral programmes, by partnerships of universities, research institutions and infrastructures, businesses including SMEs, and other socio-economic actors from different countries across EU Member States, Horizon Europe Associated Countries and beyond. These doctoral programmes will respond to well-identified needs in various research and innovation areas, expose the researchers to the academic and non-academic sectors, and offer research training, as well as transferable skills and competences relevant for innovation and long-term employability. • Standard MSCA Doctoral Networks • MSCA Doctoral Network - Industrial Doctorates: train PhD candidates who wish to develop their skills and step outside academia, in particular in industry and business. MSCA Postdoctoral Fellowships (PF) Calls in 2026-2027 Work Programme: HORIZON-MSCA-2026-PF-01: MSCA Postdoctoral Fellowships	MSCA Postdoctoral Fellowships (PFs) support researchers' careers and foster excellence in research. Objective: PFs are for researchers holding a PhD who wish to carry out their research activities abroad, acquire new skills and develop their careers. PFs help researchers gain experience in other countries, disciplines and non-academic sectors.

2026 Deadline: 9 September 2026 HORIZON-MSCA-2027-PF-01: MSCA Postdoctoral Fellowships 2027 Deadline: 8 September 2027	There are 2 types of Postdoctoral Fellowships: • European PFs: open to researchers moving within Europe or coming to Europe from another part of the world to pursue their research career. These fellowships take place in an EU Member State or Horizon Europe Associated Country and can last between 1 and 2 years. Researchers of any nationality can apply. • Global PFs: fund the mobility of researchers outside Europe. The fellowship lasts between 2 to 3 years, of which the first 1 to 2 years will be spent in a non-associated Third Country, followed by a mandatory return phase of 1 year to an organisation based in an EU Member State or Horizon Europe Associated Country. Only nationals or long-term residents of the EU Member States or Horizon Europe Associated Countries can apply. Both types of fellowships may also include short-term secondments anywhere in the world during the fellowship (except during the return phase of a Global Fellowship). To build bridges between the academic and non-academic sector, researchers can receive additional support to carry out a placement at the end of their fellowship for up to 6 months in a non-academic organisation based in an EU Member State or Horizon Europe Associated Country. Who can apply: PFs are open to all disciplines. Researchers interested in PFs: • Should have a PhD degree at the time of the deadline for applications. Applicants who have successfully defended their doctoral thesis but who have not yet formally been awarded the doctoral degree will also be considered eligible to apply. • Must have a maximum of eight years' experience in research, from the date of the award of their PhD degree. Years of experience outside research and career breaks will not count towards the above maximum, nor will years of experience in research in third countries, for nationals or long-term residents of EU Member States or Horizon Europe Associated Countries who wish to reintegrate to Europe • Should comply with mobility rules: they must not have resided or carried out their main activity (work, studies, etc.) in the country of the beneficiary (for European PFs), or the host organisation for the outgoing phase (for Global PFs) for more than 12 months in the 36 months immediately before the call deadline. PILLAR II (GLOBAL CHALLENGES AND INDUSTRIAL COMPETITIVENESS)

PILLAR II - OVERVIEW

Horizon Europe Pillar II is Global Challenge and Industrial Competitiveness.

Pillar II consists of six “Clusters”:

- **Cluster 1 – Health**
- Cluster 2 – Culture, Creativity and Inclusive Society
- Cluster 3 – Civil Security for Society
- Cluster 4 – Digital, Industry and Space
- Cluster 5 – Climate, Energy and Mobility
- Cluster 6 – Food, Bioeconomy, Natural Resources, Agriculture and Environment

There are also five ‘Missions’ in Pillar II (listed below), as well as the New European Bauhaus Facility (NEB).

- Adaptation to Climate Change
- **Cancer**
- Restore our Ocean and Waters
- Climate-Neutral and Smart Cities
- Soil Deal for Europe

There are many **health-related funding opportunities** across Pillar II, and these are detailed in this document.

Nearly all call topics in Pillar II are **challenge driven** where the European Commission specifies the research and innovation project to be done.

Funding calls in the Pillar II Work Programmes also nearly always require a consortium of organisations in different countries.

PILLAR II - CLUSTER 1: HEALTH

Cluster 1 Overview:

The aims of this cluster include improving and protecting the health and well-being of citizens of all ages by generating new knowledge, developing innovative solutions and integrating where relevant a gender perspective to prevent, diagnose, monitor, treat and cure diseases.

Further aims include developing health technologies, mitigating health risks, protecting populations and promoting good health and well-being in general and at work.

Finally, this cluster also aims to make public health systems more cost-effective, equitable and sustainable, prevent and tackle poverty-related diseases and support and enable patients' participation and self-management.

The [Horizon Europe 2026-2027 Work Programme for Health](#) (Cluster 1) has 6 destinations (subareas):

- Destination 1 - **Staying healthy in a rapidly changing society**
- Destination 2 - **Living and working in a health-promoting environment**
- Destination 3 - **Tackling diseases and reducing disease burden**
- Destination 4 - **Ensuring equal access to innovative, sustainable, and high-quality healthcare**

- Destination 5 - **Developing and using new tools, technologies and digital solutions for a healthy society**
- Destination 6 - **Maintaining an innovative, sustainable, and competitive EU health industry**

There is only one call topic with a deadline between Sept and Dec 2026 in the 2026-2027 Health Work Programme.

PILLAR II - CLUSTER 3: CIVIL SECURITY FOR SOCIETY

Cluster 3 Overview:

This cluster responds to the challenges arising from persistent security threats, including cybercrime, as well as natural and man-made disasters.

The cluster builds on lessons learnt from the COVID-19 pandemic in terms of prevention, mitigation, preparedness and capacity building for crises (including health crises) and in improving cross-sectoral aspects of such crises.

The introduction section of the [Horizon Europe 2026-2027 Work Programme for Civil Security for Society](#) (Cluster 3) mentions on page 8 “*Protecting and empowering disadvantaged groups or in a vulnerable situation.* A range of groups are disproportionately exposed to violence and threats towards their security. These include, women, LGBTIQ people, ethnic, racial or religious minorities, persons with a migrant background, **persons with disabilities, persons living with chronic illnesses**, older people and children. The vulnerability of these groups is further exacerbated by factors such as insecure supply chains for **essential medicines** which can be disrupted by disasters or criminal activities.”

The [Horizon Europe 2026-2027 Work Programme for Civil Security for Society](#) (Cluster 3) has 6 destinations (subareas):

- Destination: Better protect the EU and its citizens against Crime and Terrorism
- Destination: Effective management of EU external borders
- Destination: Resilient Infrastructure

- Destination: Disaster-Resilient Society for Europe
- Destination: Strengthened Security Research and Innovation

These destinations contain call topics which are **challenge driven** where the European Commission specifies the research and innovation project to be done, however within the Cluster 3 Work Programme some of the call topics are **open call topics** which are less prescriptive than in other Work Programmes in Pillar 2 of Horizon Europe. Research and innovation funded under this Destination will contribute to a range of policy objectives including EU Regulation (2022/2371) on **serious cross-border threats to health**.

Deadline: 5 Nov 2026	Expected Outcome: "This call topic aims to fight the issue of missing persons relying on the synergy of technology, the latest socio-psychological knowledge learned from cases as well as field experience of Police Authorities and entities dealing with victims." Scope: "People may go missing under a variety of circumstances, such as ...cases related to mental health crises. Groups in a vulnerable situation - notably ... persons with disabilities and persons suffering from cognitive impairments face an even greater risk of going missing. Deadline: 5 Nov 2026	Expected Outcome: "Demonstration of advanced technological solutions that enhance the ability of public and private providers of critical services to prepare for, respond to, and recover from complex, multi-hazard scenarios ..." "Deployment of common platforms and operational tools for dynamic risk assessment, decision support, between public authorities, first responders, and critical infrastructure operators during disruptive events" Scope: The call topic notes that "ensuring the monitoring, protection and continuity of essential services has become fundamental to preserving and enhancing societal resilience." It states that "Proposals should also demonstrate cross-border, multi-actor coordination mechanisms through simulations or testing in real operational environments, involving public authorities, emergency responders, and critical service operators or representative environments where critical infrastructure is particularly exposed to multi-hazard risks."

Destination: Increased Cybersecurity

The Cybersecurity actions proposed under this destination are designed to reinforce the EU's ability to detect, prevent, and respond to cyber threats, including those targeting critical infrastructure. The call topics under this destination do not specifically mention health related aspects, although they are open in scope. Destination: Disaster-Resilient Society for Europe

As one of the key objectives of this destination is '**supporting medical countermeasures against public health threats**', there are multiple references to health within the introduction including;

'follow a multi-hazard approach, addressing disasters and threats of all kinds, including their cascading issues, climate-related or natural or human-made and geological hazards, industrial accidents, **pandemics ...**

'provide the means for regional and/or local decision-makers and operational responders, i.e., first and second responders. A "second responder" is a worker who supports "first responders" such as police, fire, and **emergency medical personnel**.'

'Strengthen resilience and enhancing protection strategies for **emergency services and healthcare workers** in case of disasters"

"Enhance preparedness for **optimised detection, prevention, response and control measures in case of** bioterrorism or **emerging diseases**."

“Deploy innovative solutions in emergency situations including trusted communication channels, **emergency medical response, including triage of victims pre-hospital and clinical services, medical countermeasures, support equipment (e.g. detectors), as well as protection of first responders**”

“Enhance ... responses to climate-related and geological disasters and emergency crises by different practitioner sectors (firefighters, **medical emergency services**, civil protection, police, NGOs)”

“Education and training aspects for **first and second responders** for different types of threats... and adapted to all types of **disability**.”

HORIZON-CL3-2026-01-DRS-01: Designing new ways of risk awareness and enhanced disaster preparedness RIA. Deadline: 5 Nov 2026	Expected Outcome: This call topic aims to support among others the development of “comprehensive, inclusive preparedness plans that involve all societal sectors and governance levels, ensuring coordinated and effective responses to disasters (such as from early warning to early action), including scarcity of resources...” Scope: “Proposals should work towards the creation of comprehensive, multi-stakeholder preparedness plans that involve all levels of governance, civil society, the private sector, and local communities.” “Special attention should be given to marginalized or vulnerable groups in a vulnerable situation ensure equitable access to risk information and preparedness resources.”
HORIZON-CL3-2026-01-DRS-02: Multi-hazard approach and cumulative / cascading impacts IA. Deadline: 5 Nov 2026	Expected Outcome: This call topic aims to develop “holistic risk and resilience metrics to support multi-hazard prevention strategies, encompassing main physical, economic and social effects.” Scope: “A holistic, systemic, and cross-cutting approach should be applied...taking into consideration ...vulnerabilities such as gender, age, disabilities and others social factors.” “Projects should contribute to strengthening risk governance at multiple levels by fostering collaboration between scientific communities, policymakers, emergency responders, and infrastructure operators.”

R&I activities aim at empowering farmers, fishers and aquaculture producers to efficiently transform their production methods, making the best use of Nature-based Solutions, technological, digital and social innovations and transferable knowledge while supporting fair incomes and the competitiveness of the entire EU food value chain. This will accelerate climate mitigation and result in positive environmental outcomes, increased climate resilience and reduced dependency on pesticides and antimicrobials, fostering multi-disciplinary approaches including the **One Health approach**. Furthermore, it will also provide consumers with affordable, safe, **nutritious, healthy and sustainable food**.”

“R&I also seek to stimulate sustainable practices at all stages of the food system, (from production to processing services, the use and valorisation of waste and by-products and surplus management) and to ensure safe and sustainable food and enable a shift to sustainable and **healthy diets for all**.” The cluster is strongly committed to the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) including SDG3 on Good health and well-being.

PILLAR III - OVERVIEW

Pillar III of Horizon Europe (Innovative Europe) has three main parts, each of which contains a variety of funding opportunities which are summarised below and then explained in more detail further on in this document.

- **[European Innovation Council \(EIC\)](#): The EIC has a mix of "Open Calls" (for projects in any fields of science, technology or application without predefined priorities) and "Challenge Calls" (with predefined thematic areas).** The EIC is Horizon Europe's flagship innovation programme to identify, develop and scale-up game changing innovations. Some EIC funding calls require a consortium of organisations in different countries, whilst other EIC funding calls are open to a single organisation.
- **[European Innovation Ecosystems \(EIE\)](#): The EIE contributes to improving the overall ecosystem for innovation in Europe.** The EU aims to create more connected and efficient innovation ecosystems to support the scaling up of companies, encourage innovation and stimulate cooperation among national, regional and local innovation actors.
 - EIE also funds Eurostars, Innowide, Investment Readiness and the Fast Track to the EIC Accelerator. Further details on these (and other Eureka schemes) are provided in the EIE section of this document.
- The **[European Institute of Innovation and Technology \(EIT\)](#) is Europe's largest innovation network.**

PILLAR III - EUROPEAN INNOVATION COUNCIL (EIC)

EIC Overview:

The **[European Innovation Council \(EIC\)](#) is Horizon Europe's flagship innovation programme to identify, develop and scale-up game breakthrough technologies and game changing innovations.** The EIC has a budget of €10.1 billion to support game changing innovations throughout the lifecycle from early-stage research to proof of concept, technology transfer, and the financing and scale up of startups and SMEs.

The most recently published EIC Work Programme is the [European Innovation Council \(EIC\) 2026 Work Programme](#) (including a useful table summarising the main calls on page 9) and there is also a useful [EIC website with further information about the 2026 Work Programme](#). The main calls for proposals are listed below and explained in more detail in the tables further on in this document.

- **EIC Transition (€100 million)** to turn research results into innovation opportunities, following up on results generated by EIC Pathfinder projects, European Research Council (ERC) Proof of Concept projects, Horizon Europe Pillar 2 (societal challenges) collaborative projects and Research Infrastructures projects (grants up to €2.5 million).
- **Advanced Innovation Challenges Pilot (€6 million)** to support high-risk, demand-driven deep tech innovation with transformative potential especially in areas where there is extensive research but lack of commercial uptake (grants up to €300,000 lump sum).
- **EIC Accelerator (€634 million)** for startups and SMEs to develop and scale up innovations with the potential to create new markets or disrupt existing ones (grants below €2.5 million, investments from €0.5 to €10 million). Open for defence and dual-use technologies since 17 June 2026.
- The **EIC Strategic Technologies for Europe Platform (STEP) Scale Up (€300 million)**, which will provide additional equity funding to promising companies (SMEs, startups, spin-offs and small mid-caps) driving innovation in critical areas to help them secure larger private co-investment rounds of €50 million or above for further scaling their businesses (investments from €10 to €30 million). Open for defence and dual-use technologies since 17 June 2026.
- **EIC STEP Scale Up Defence call (€100 million)** with up to €30 million in direct equity financing to accelerate the scale-up of industrial capabilities on, among others, air and missile defence, drones and counter drones, and other critical defence technologies. This is the first time any EU funding programme will ever invest direct equity in defence companies.
- There is also an **EIC Pre-Accelerator** call which is a joint scheme between the EIC and the [Widening participation and strengthening the European Research Area \(WIDERA\)](#) programme. It is funded under the [WIDERA Work Programme 2026-2027](#). The aim of the call is to boost the innovation potential of early-stage deep-tech startups in widening countries by enhancing their business, investor, and technology readiness to secure funding from different sources.

The EIC has a mix of:

- **“Open Calls”** (for projects in any fields of science, technology or application without predefined priorities) and
- **“Challenge Calls”** (with predefined thematic areas - in the 2026 Work Programme these are for the EIC Pathfinder, EIC Advanced Innovation Challenges and EIC Accelerator calls)

EIC Pathfinder funding calls require a consortium of organisations in different countries, whilst EIC Transition and EIC Advanced Innovation Challenges can either be a consortium or single applicant. The EIC Accelerator and EIC STEP are for single applicants that must be an SME.

The eligibility rules for each partnership can also change call by call, so please always read the guidance and call documents for the specific call that you are interested in to find out which countries and which types of organisation are eligible for funding.**

In the **Health Cluster** there are 10 partnerships, each of which has a Strategic Research and Innovation Agenda (SRIA). Each of the Health partnerships is explained in the next section below, and each Health partnership (apart from PARC) run calls for proposals.

The **Innovative Health Initiative (IHI)** is the [successor to the Innovative Medicines Initiative \(IMI\)](#) but broadened to include prevention, diagnostics, treatment and disease management including Pharma, Biotech, MedTech, Vaccines, Radiological, Electromedical and the Healthcare IT Industry.

The IHI has a total budget of €2.4 billion (for calls for proposals between 2021 and 2027). It is a partnership between the European Union represented by the European Commission and the Healthcare industry associations:

- COCIR (medical imaging, radiotherapy, health ICT and electromedical industries)
- EFPIA, including Vaccines Europe (pharmaceutical and vaccine industries)
- EuropaBio (biotechnology industry)
- MedTech Europe (medical technology industry)

IHI calls for proposals nearly always require a consortium of organisations in different countries.

Global Health EDCTP3 (European and Developing Countries Clinical Trials Partnership)

The **Global Health EDCTP3 (European and Developing Countries Clinical Trials Partnership)** is a unique European and African partnership working to improve health through research and development. Backed by the European Union and over 45 countries, it focuses on infectious diseases that continue to harm millions across sub-Saharan Africa. It has an expected budget of €1.84 billion (2021 to 2027) which consists of €890 million from the EU/Horizon Europe, €550 million from the [EDCTP Association](#) and €400 million from third parties.

The Global Health EDCTP3 vision is to reduce the individual, social, and economic burden of poverty-related infectious diseases, including neglected, emerging and re-emerging diseases, in sub-Saharan Africa. Their Mission is to reduce mortality and morbidity in sub-Saharan Africa by supporting global collaborative research, capacity strengthening, and speeding up the development, evaluation, and implementation of innovative solutions to prevent, detect, treat and monitor infectious diseases.

Global Health EDCTP3 calls for proposals nearly always require a consortium of organisations in different countries.

The **European Rare Disease Research Alliance (ERDERA)** is the European partnership uniting over 170 public and private organisations across 37 countries around a single goal: turning cutting-edge science into tangible benefits for the thirty million Europeans living with a rare disease.

The European Union contributes around €150 million to this co-funded partnership via Horizon Europe, while the rest of the funding comes from Member States, countries associated to Horizon Europe and in cash and in-kind contributions from public and private partners.

ERDERA's vision is better prevention, better diagnosis and better treatment. ERDERA works towards making Europe a world leader in rare diseases research and innovation, supporting concrete health benefits to rare diseases patients through improved prevention, diagnosis and treatment.

The partnership will strengthen transnational collaboration as well as increase and better align investments in brain-related research and innovation. Its mission is to promote the translation of research findings into tailored solutions for prevention, diagnosis, treatment and care accessible to all.

EP BrainHealth plans to launch two Joint Transnational Calls for proposals (JTCs) each year between 2026 and 2032. EP BrainHealth also plans to launch various other types of funding opportunities.

COST

[COST \(European Cooperation in Science and Technology\)](#) is a funding organisation for **research and innovation networks**.

A COST Action is an interdisciplinary research network that brings researchers and innovators together to investigate **a topic of their choice** for 4 years. COST Actions are typically made up of researchers from academia, SMEs, public institutions, and other relevant organisations or interested parties.

Open to **all science and technology fields**, including new and emerging fields; COST Actions offer an inclusive, pan-European environment for individuals of all levels of seniority to grow their professional research networks and boost their careers.

COST Actions:

- Are "bottom up" multidisciplinary and disciplinary research networks in research fields **proposed by researchers themselves**. This maximises scientific freedom to initiate and develop groundbreaking topics with global networks of researchers, SMEs and other entities.
- Do not fund research, but instead fund the **networking, training, leadership and dissemination activities** that are the engine room for talented researchers including younger researchers involved in international research collaboration.

You can participate in an existing COST action or apply to set up a new COST action. Further information about both options is available on the [COST website](#).

Search the [COST Actions website](#) for COST actions that are running (i.e. 4 years' worth of Actions including Cost Innovator Grants) – as June 2027 this included 361 actions including health topics and 131 including medical topics.

The true value of COST is in **acting as a pump priming mechanism for EU/global R&I collaboration** in the following ways:

- (i) **launching young scientists' international careers** in all fields
- (ii) previous COST participants see **a 38% higher success rate in subsequent Horizon Europe grant applications**
- (iii) **the bureaucratic threshold is lower for COST** than large Horizon Europe consortia projects but the experience gained from COST is beneficial when applying for larger Horizon Europe projects
- (iv) **it is a training ground to develop key soft skills for scientists in international collaboration** i.e. leading people in a consortium, collaborative decision making, and driving global projects.
